

R User Groups Report

Despite being the birthplace of R, New Zealand has seen a relatively slow development of a linked community of R users and R User Groups (RUGs). Of course there have been many talks concerning ways to use R (for better or worse) over the years, but as befits one of R's founders, Ross Ihaka gave what appears to be the first talk to a fledgling R Users Group at Waikato University on 16 October 2011. That talk was probably the inspiration for the only subsequent meeting (so far) of the Waikato R Users Group in April 2012, organised jointly by Vanessa Cave and Steven Miller (also the joint chairs of the 2013 NZSA+ORSNZ Conference, as it happens!). Steven emailed me to note there could be some further discussion on this particular RUG's future activities during the 2013 Conference.

This year has seen a definite increase in RUG activity though, so much so that we now have an R User Groups Representative, John Haywood, on the NZSA Exec. The NZSA is keen to endorse and celebrate the strong links between R and the current New Zealand statistics community. An R users group was formed in Auckland on 9 January 2013, with their first meeting facilitated using Meetup on 8 March attended by 33 people. A second meeting followed, addressed by Thomas Lumley and with 38 attendees, on 25 September. The Auckland R users group (AKLRUG) is organized by JieFu Yu and Lisa Chen, and they now have 146 members signed up on their Meetup site, which is here: <http://www.meetup.com/Auckland-R-Users-Group-AKLRUG/>

Peter Ellis, the Manager of Sector Performance in the Ministry of Business, Innovation and Employment, was keen to increase the use of R within his team, and in the government sector more generally. Peter teamed up with long-time R user and NZSA Exec member Ian Westbrooke from the Department of Conservation and together they addressed a very well attended (100+ people) lunchtime meeting in Wellington on 13 June 2013, titled "Statistical Analysis in the Government Sector using R Language: Experiences from MBIE and DOC". That presentation was the catalyst for a Wellington Statistics Group meeting, attended by 45 people on 15 August, where we launched the Wellington R Users Group (WRUG), which currently has 63 members. Our second WRUG meeting was the first organised using Meetup, with 32 attendees on 10 October. A third WRUG meeting is currently being planned for mid-December 2013. Lisa Chen (Harmonic Analytics) from the AKLRUG organising team has also played a role in setting up WRUG, along with James Hogan (MBIE) and Shirley Wu (Harmonic Analytics). Moving forward, there have been discussions concerning the formation of a RUG in Christchurch, and the above discussion about the Waikato group hints at a potential re-birth there. Harmonic Analytics have got several people who are keen to share some of their experiences with R, as evidenced by their membership of various RUG organizing teams. I am keen to hear about any further developments or suggestions in regard to the growth of the NZSA's involvement in this increasing popularization of the use of R.
